ADVICE FOR THE PRESENTATION

What is a good presentation

- **You are the teacher!** What do you want the audience to learn?
- What should the audience remember? Could be:
 - Key technical ideas
 - Enough to be able to read the paper and learn more
 - Your own contribution
- The presentation should have a structure
 - Logical and easy to follow
- Use **pictures and examples**
 - Preferably your own; acknowledge any borrowed pictures on the slide

Presentation structure

- Begin by **introducing the topic**; set the scene
- Next, give an **outline** for the talk
 - What are you going to talk about
 - Why is it important
- For the **main content**, focus on what is useful for the audience
 - Don't try to repeat everything that is in the paper
- Close with a summary or conclusion
 - What should we remember: **take-home message**

Some detailed advice

- Think, can you write it in fewer words?
- Avoid meaningless boilerplate text
- Don't use unnecessary animations
- Use color and pictures when meaningful
- Show the whole slide, not bullet by bullet
- Don't read directly from the slide
- Stop for a second before moving to the next slide
- Practiced timing often fails; plan what to do if you run out of time or finish too early
